6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Barasat College carries the torch of education to spread the light of knowledge and illuminate even the farthest corners of the society.

The vision of the institution is to provide maximum educational facilities to the learners belonging to the weaker and underprivileged section of the society, coming from rural and semi-urban area and to enrich them in their academic field as well as carrier-oriented field.

MISSION:

The mission of the institution is to provide "Life Centric and job oriented" quality higher education through a modern multi-faculty college wherein the students can be well taught and trained to build social awareness and responsibilities towards the society and to become partners in the socio-economic development of the country. Ours is a semi-urban college surrounded by agriculture-based areas and our students are mostly first -generation learners. It is a matter of great challenge for us to spread the periphery of higher education quantitatively without compromising quality. We try to input social value among the students. It is highly expected that they will convey it to the larger society.

The mission of Barasat College is to educate its students to help creating a self-reliant, self- sustaining, self-confident self- respectful and innovative generation to present India with a skilled human resource that is free from the shackles of narrowness, selfishness or prejudice and competent enough to feed the need of the emergent India.

The college takes on the great challenge of providing a uniform milieu for education acceptable to the students and their families in the semi -urban region from mainly an agrarian society but hailing from a diverse socio-eco-cultural and religious background.

We constantly innovate, upgrade, modify and modernize the administrative management and teaching methods to keep it contemporary.

The benefits of education should not be limited to only a few. Barasat College has the mission of widen the access to education for under-privileged sections of the society to integrate them in the process of nation building.

We offer different course options for higher education in science, humanities and commerce to suit the differing needs of youth, who want to get themselves educated.

Conventional education only is not adequate for all round human development. Barasat College encourages its students in developing their skills in co and extra-curricular activities in sports and cultural arena.

It is an undergraduate college having B.A., B.Sc. and B.Com. programmes. In the past our college was affiliated to Calcutta University. To satisfy the needs of the society we have introduced different honours courses phase by phase with proper approval from Calcutta University.

After the formation of West Bengal State University for the district of North 24-Parganas we have come under the affiliation of this new University. We have introduced honours courses in Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Mathematics and Computer Science in 2012 after getting approval from the West Bengal State University. PG teaching is imparted through the Distance Education Mode under Rabindra Bharati University since 2008 in eight subjects. The college has received the necessary permission from the Higher Education Council for the opening of self-financial PG Courses in Commerce and Bengali. One of the essential strengths of the college is its student strength of nearly 7,000 students per session. The number is likely to double if we consider the PG Courses in distance and regular mode in future.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the curriculum of West Bengal State University with which it is affiliated. Several teachers of the college are members of the Board of Studies of different departments of the affiliating university. They offer important feedback and suggestions for curriculum development in the relevant meetings. Teachers actively participate in workshops arranged by the University on Curriculum development.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning:

- Students give Classroom presentation on specific topics.
- Assignment of project work to the students.
- Field surveys and educational tours as per requirement.
- Use of projector for teaching subjects and watching subject related documentaries.

The College regularly conducts internal examinations like class tests, mid-term, test, etc and evaluates the overall performance of the students. Guardians of the students who performed poorly in these examinations are called and informed.

6.3.4 Research and Development:

Four teachers are engaged in doctoral research. Faculties regularly participate in conferences, workshop and publish paper to remain up-to-date with recent developments in the subject.

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Strength of the Institution

- The college is situated at the district headquarter of North 24-Parganas and wellconnected by rail and road transport system. Other facilities like Bank, Post office, District Library, Stadium, etc. are in close proximity of the college.
- The college has highly talented and well equipped teachers and student friendly staff who ensure quality teaching and smooth running of the college office.
- A large number of applicants each year reflect the high demand for courses running in the college.
- The urge for higher studies among students coming from financially challenged backgrounds has helped the institution to fulfill its greater social responsibilities.
- Transparent on-line admission process, remedial classes and counseling for slowlearners, provision for adult and continuing education through RBU have added our strength.
- A strong student support structure exists in the college. Various types of financial assistance are extended to the students through waiver of tuition fees, stipend to SC ST OBC Minority Community, etc.

Weaknesses of the Institution

- Space constraint is one of the weaknesses of the college given the annual increase in the number of students and courses. New classrooms are immediate need of the institute.
- Numbers of teaching and non-teaching staff are quite and many posts are lying vacant which results into a very high student staff ratio.
- The college is yet to have its own hostel.
- The college has no play ground of its own.

Challenges before the Institution

Academic performance of the students is to be improved to a large extent. As the large number of students mostly belongs to financially weaker section of the society and most of them are first generation learner, it requires both financial supports during their studies and preparing them to earn a respectable livelihood in future. College is working in that direction. The staff and infrastructural facilities need a lot of improvement for further improving the teaching-learning environment.

- Physical growth and expansion of the Institution through completion of the construction of classroom in new building.
- Appointment of more full time teaching staff and introduction of new UG and PG courses.
- Creating new posts for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- The institution wishes to introduce Entry-in-Service Cell for SC, ST, OBC and Minority students and also continue remedial classes for SC, ST, OBC and Minority students despite shortage of staff.
